

## What is the News? (Level 1)

Description	Learners will write their own newspaper reporting on COVID19 and designing the other sections
<b>Leading Question</b>	How do we organize and compile news in a newspaper?
Subjects	Literacy, Mathematics, Numeracy, Art and Design
<b>Total Time Required</b>	4.5 hours over 6 days
Self-guided/Supervised activity	Medium
Resources Required	Paper and pencil, access to a newspaper
Learning Outcomes	<ol> <li>By the end of this project, learners will be able to:         <ol> <li>Identify the important sections in a newspaper.</li> <li>Create and design a comic strip story.</li> <li>Apply basic math and numeracy skills to create games for the newspaper.</li> </ol> </li> <li>Compile original work to create a newspaper.</li> </ol>
Previous Learning	Exposure to newspapers and relevant sections.

## Day 1 -

Today you will learn about what makes up a newspaper.

Suggested Duration	Activity and Description
15 minutes	<ul> <li>Warm up:</li> <li>Look at an example of a newspaper and think about designing your own newspaper for your home.</li> <li>You are going to include different sections such as: News Feature Story, Opinion/Editorial, Weather, Games</li> </ul>
30 minutes	<ul> <li>Look at a newspaper with your parents/teachers to understand what each of the sections are and then 'read' these out to them in a simple way.</li> <li>Let's make links between the text and your life, the text and the world and the text and other texts.</li> <li>Let's describe what each of these sections are about based on your understanding.</li> </ul>

### Day 2 -

Today you will create a comic strip and learn more about the impact of COVID19 lockdown.

Time	Activity and Description
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30 minutes	<ul> <li>Illustrate and "write" about the impact of the coronavirus lockdown at home.</li> <li>Think about a few important questions in groups:</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>What does a normal day look like during the lockdown – what happens through the day and what do people at home do? How did a normal day look like before lockdown?</li> <li>What is everyone's mood at home?</li> <li>What is everyone doing to make sure they protect themselves from the coronavirus?</li> <li>What is nice about staying at home?</li> </ul>
60 minutes	<ul> <li>Let's create a comic strip!</li> <li>Create a comic strip about a day at home and how it can be fun.</li> <li>Comic strips can be 4-8 boxes long.</li> <li>The boxes should depict the events of the day in the order in which they occur.</li> <li>Create the characters for their comic strip and name them. Then write or ask your parent to write a blurb beside the character of what he or she is thinking or saying.</li> <li>Present your comic strip to your family members and listen to their feedback.</li> <li>Use the feedback to revise your comic strip.</li> </ul>

## Day 3 -

Today you will learn about the weather and draw a weather forecast for your newspaper.

Time	Activity and Description
40 minutes	<ul> <li>Identify and write the season that you are in (spring, summer, autumn, or winter).</li> <li>Write what that weather feels like: hot/cold/perfect.</li> <li>Draw the weather with the associated icons of the sun, clouds, rain, snowflakes.</li> <li>Draw yourselves with the appropriate clothes to wear for each weather and activities to do in the weather.</li> </ul>

### Day 4 -

Today you will design a new game for everyone to play and a feedback form for your newspaper.

Time	Activity and Description
20 minutes	Design a fun game:
	First, design an engaging game that you can play at home for the final

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	section. Example:
	<ul> <li>I will sing a song, and everyone has to dance. When I stop singing, everyone has to freeze. Whoever does not freeze is out.</li> </ul>
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<u>De</u>	esign a fun numeracy game:
•	Think about some of the games that are usually found in the newspapers,
	such as crosswords or sudokus that invite readers to have fun with math.
•	Try to do the same in your newspaper.
•	Think about a game where you are playing with missing numbers. For
	example, you can come up with a game like this:
	- "Find the missing numbers in this strip: 5 15 30"
	- or "How many ways are there to add up to 6?"
•	Don't forget to attach an answer sheet to your game or games!

**Day 5 -** *Today you will use your art skills to put your newspaper together.* 

Time	Activity and Description
20 minutes	<ul> <li>Design your own newspaper!</li> <li>Start designing your newspaper layout (a layout is how the texts, titles, and images are distributed in each page).</li> <li>You can use more than one sheet of paper for your newspaper. You can even paste together 3 or 4 sheets, to have more space, such as real newspapers.</li> <li>Play around with fun shapes to organize the information. For instance, each section can be laid out as a different shape (square, rectangle, triangle, pentagon etc.).</li> <li>Think about the name of your newspaper and write it down.</li> </ul>
20 minutes	<ul> <li>Design a feedback form for the readers of the newspaper.</li> <li>Make sure that:         <ul> <li>The feedback form needs to include at least three questions.</li> <li>You give respondents some choices for answers.</li> <li>Reflect about the kind of questions that you would have to ask to know if someone understood your ideas and liked your newspapers.</li> </ul> </li> <li>These are some of the questions that they may include:         <ol> <li>The drawings are nice</li> <li>Everything is easy to understand</li> <li>The game was fun</li> </ol> </li> <li>Tip: You can gather responses as (Strongly Agree :D / Agree ② / Disagree ③)</li> </ul>



# **Day 6 -**Today you will share your newspaper with your family and hear their feedback.

Time	Activity and Description
20 minutes	<ul> <li>Present your work!</li> <li>Share the completed newspaper with family members.</li> <li>Explain the different sections in your own newspapers and encourage your family to play the games in the games section.</li> </ul>
10 minutes	Collect feedback on the survey from your family.
10 minutes	Reflect on the feedback and try to make some changes based on your family's feedback.  Tip: create a tally chart based on the feedback and identify what the readers liked the most, what the readers liked the least, etc.

Additional enrichment activities:	Learners can write news articles about local events and include it in their newspapers.
Modifications for simplification	Learners can work in pairs to help each other design a comic strip.
